“ Charlie Smiley was my friend and study partner for four years from 1962 to 1965 starting at the VPI branch in Danville. Charlie, Bobby Robinette and I started college later than most students. Charlie had been playing professional baseball, I had been in the Marine Corps, and Bobby had been in the Army. We were all learning how to study all over again and the VPI branch was difficult. In fact when we got to Blacksburg we found the classes less challenging than they had been in Danville. Our study approach involved developing questions to test each other. Charlie was a serious student and majored in accounting, clearly the most difficult major in the college of business. In Blacksburg we taught each other, celebrated our successes together, and suffered our setbacks together. We drank beer at the Golden Gobbler and some truck stop on the other end of town where they put tomato juice in the beer. You could not drink beer at a bar or restaurant in Blacksburg when we were there. There were no bars. Charlie and Bobby also served as baby-sitters for us on occasion and they were much appreciated. In 1965 we all went in different directions and lost touch with each other, but I will always remember Charlie, and I am very sad to hear about his death. I was surprised to read that he became a minister, but I'm sure I would have enjoyed one of Charlie's sermons. I suspect they included some unique mixture of biblical, baseball and accounting terminology.
