Lafayette Jackson Wall, 92, of Danville, Virginia, died on Tuesday, April 19, 2016 at Brookdale Stokesland after being in declining health for the past three years.

Mr. Wall was born on May 7, 1923, in Danville, VA son of the late William Thomas Wall and the late Salley Beth Lindsey. He spent all of his life in the Danville area where he worked as a Machinist for Dan River Mills. He was a graduate of George Washington High School.
